Home Learning Policy

'Where Learning is an Adventure'

What are the aims of this policy?

• To ensure that teachers, parents and children have a clear understanding regarding expectations for home learning.

Why is home learning important?

- It helps to inform you about your children's schoolwork and allows and gives you the opportunity to support this work.
- It is a valuable life skill and develops good work habits for secondary school and future employment.

Roles and Responsibilities

School:

- To provide support for parents with information about home learning.
- To be available to talk to parents and children about home learning.
- To ensure all home learning is put on the class website pages.

Parent/Carers:

- To support the child in completing home learning
- To contact the class teacher whenever a problem arises.

How much time should my child spend on their home learning?

You know your child best and how long they can reasonably spend completing home learning tasks. However, some home learning such as the 'Termly Topic Take Home Tasks' may require more time due to the fun and engaging nature of them.

It is recommended, that where possible, time should be given over daily to reading. This can be built into part of your daily routine, for example, sharing a book as part of a bedtime routine.

What home learning will my child be given?

To support children's reading across the school, every class takes part in the 'Blast off into Reading' challenge. In 'Blast off into Reading', each child is expected to read for a minimum of 3 times a week and this should be recorded in their reading record. If children are successful in doing this, they move around the board and once they have reached a certain point they receive a raffle ticket and are entered into a weekly draw to win a book.

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'Where Learning is an Adventure'

Year group home learning opportunities are provided as follows:

Reception

- Reading books from class 'banded' books are sent home books are changed by the children during the week
- Key words for reading and or spelling
- Key sounds of the week put in children's reading records
- Topic chats provide opportunities for activities at home to enhance learning

Year 1 and 2

- Reading books from class are sent home books are changed by the children during the week
- Common exception words for the year group that they need to learn to read and spell are sent home at the beginning of the year (see Appendix 1)
- Termly topic take home tasks

Years 3 - 6

- Reading books from class are chosen by children to take home books are changed regularly.
- Common exception words at the appropriate level for each child are sent home at the beginning of the year. Children need to learn to read and spell these words.
- Termly topic take home tasks

Further opportunities for home learning

Every term, each year group holds a topic chat for parents. This is a good way to find out more about the expectations for spellings and key words to be learnt. At these meetings a selection of ideas for curriculum take home tasks are given out, which are more creative ways of learning that the whole family can join in with.

Throughout the school, children are working on their Maths Mission targets. This starts with counting and moves on to learning the times tables and division facts. Practising these facts at home would benefit your child's learning. Each child has a login for Times Table Rockstars and Numbots, which they can use at home to practice their number facts.
