Please complete two of the tasks by the end of our topic. Of course, you are very welcome to complete more than two of the tasks if you wish!

<u>Exploring</u> Go for a walk in your local area and write a list or sketch all the things you see on your walk e.g. trees, animals, flowers, the sea.	From buzz to jar Research how honey is made and draw a journey starting with the bee and ending with the honey.	<u>Where are my clothes from?</u> Look at your clothes and find out what they are made of. Sort them into manmade and natural materials. Where did the materials come from? Do some research and create a poster.	<u>Famous explorers</u> Research a famous explorer. You can choose how you record what you have found out.
<u>Mâché madness</u> Make a papier mâché globe. You could even label the different continents and oceans.	<u>Country crazy</u> Do some research about a country. Which continent is it in? What's the capital city? Find out about its climate, what crops can grow there and any other interesting facts. You can choose how you present this.	<u>Travel time</u> Make your own travel brochure. Make a booklet to encourage someone to visit a particular country. You could include flags, maps, facts and pictures.	Make something out of nothing Choose just 4 things out of your recycling. Design and create something useful from these items.
<u>Bin'it</u> Research why litter is a problem on beaches and design a persuasive sign and an attractive bin to make people throw their litter away.	<u>Pebble art</u> Find a flat pebble or stone and create a design on the theme of nature. Draw/paint this on your stone.	<u>Coast vs Country</u> Where would you prefer to live, by the sea or in the countryside? You decide and present this in any way you like.	<u>Design an eco-home</u> Do some research about pollution and climate change and think about how a home could be created with this in mind. Think about water, electricity, warmth etc. You could even create your eco home in a box!
