Plus, it's Mr. Jones' favourite—so you know it's a great read! 😰 🛠



*Miss Walsh loves The Last Firefox*. Mandela have loved reading it and have been on the edge of their seats.







Mrs Owen loves reading The Book With No Pictures by B J Novak. It's silly and funny and repeatedly requested by the children.


Mrs Owen's own favourite childhood book is The Wind in the Willows because I love the beautiful, lyrical language used.















# Let Girls Play Initiative



Today, we are joining schools and clubs across the country in celebrating the Let Girls Play initiative, which is a government and FA-backed scheme promoting equal opportunities, specifically aimed at increasing girls' participation in football and their love for the sport. This is an annual event that coincides with International Women's Day (which, this year, takes place on 8<sup>th</sup> March). As the organisers themselves say: "Your school will be part of a nationwide celebration, highlighting the importance of inclusivity in sports, showing pupils in your school that **girls belong in football**."

#### Why are we celebrating this initiative?

A recent Women in Sport survey found that more than one million teenage girls (43%) who once considered themselves 'sporty', disengage from sport following primary school. The two main reasons given were:

- A fear of feeling judged (68%)
- A lack of confidence (61%)

At Rudyard, we believe in inclusivity and are extremely proud of our current offer for girls' sport; there are always ways that we can further improve, however, and days like this allow us to raise the profile of girls' sport and overcome some of the barriers mentioned above.

#### How we will deliver our Let Girls Play sessions

As usual, children will have access to football throughout the week, during lunchtimes and after school clubs; in addition to this, Mr Wynne and Mr Mack will be running sessions at lunchtime for girls in Years 3-6 to participate in some fun football-based games. This will allow girls the chance to have a go at something they might not usually do, and hopefully inspire them to take up the sport! These sessions will be separate from the normal football provision at lunchtimes.

#### Equal Access Award

You may have seen that we recently received the Equal Access Award in recognition of our commitment to providing girls with the same sporting opportunities as boys. We are very proud of this award and it only inspires us to further improve our sporting offer for **all** children.


