A special thank you to Mr Hoad for organising another superb event, and to the Sports Leaders at Longhill School for their help and support.



Tidy by Emily Gravett




Ms Nazarko recommended!



- Children can use whichever level they want when playing TTRS Jamming, Gig, Garage etc. The TTRS algorithm will automatically filter the times tables your child needs to work on.
- All children are automatically entered into the tournament, so they can just start playing!
- Just like the February half term competition, the live league table will be visible for children, so they can see how they're getting on! Certificates and prizes will be handed out in the first Friday assembly of Summer 1 (Friday 25th April).

 SHAKE YOUR EGGS CAREFULLY TO SCRAMBLE THE INSIDES SO IT IS EASIER TO BLOW OUT.

 VERY GENTLY POKE A SMALL HOLE IN THE TOP AND BOTTOM OF YOUR EGG. BE CAREFUL NOT TO APPLY TOO MUCH PRESSURE WITH THE NEEDLE AND YOUR FINGERS ON THE SIDES AS YOU MAY CRACK THE EGG!

 PLACE YOUR EGGS IN THE BOWL OF HOT WATER RIGHT AFTER YOU BLOW THEM.
 HOLD EACH ONE UNDER FOR A SECOND TO GET WATER INSIDE OF IT. I USED A SMALL PLATE AS A WEIGHT TO HOLD THEM UNDER. ALLOW THEM TO SIT FOR 10 MINUTES.

LEAVE YOUR EGGS TO DRY FOR 24
 HOURS ON KITCHEN TOWEL. THEN YOU
 CAN DECORATE!

Magic Johnson- retired basketball player



Considered one of the best point guards of all time, Magic Johnson played for the LA Lakers basketball team. He was an impressive 6 ft 9 in (2.06m) and known for his extraordinary court vision, passing abilities, and leadership, Johnson was one of the most dominant players of his era. Johnson has spoken openly about his dyslexia and the challenges he faced at school. He has shared that by taking extra classes and working really hard he has learned all the skills he needed to achieve in life, and achieved he has! His awards and titles are extensive, including 5 NBA championships between 1980-1988.
